Besides food, it also masters early trade and generosity whereby the words it sings say they purchased buns at a penny. The teachers usually use it in one of the music classes to learn the rhythm, melody, and elementary practice with the

instruments. Vocabulary, counting and cultural customs are taught to children using the rhyme. Hot Cross Buns has not only managed to maintain its popularity as a song, but as an orientation of children to the history, as well as the festivals of the seasons.
