Children love its rhythm, and the idea of climbing and falling, and parents and teachers use it in order to master sequencing and cause-effect. The rhyme could be on political grounds with interpretations that occur in the past in ancient England but now it is simply fun and light hearted of a story. Repeating of Jack and Jill provides children with an exercise in remembrance, words, and storytelling and the images encourage fantasy. It has become and always will be an obligatory rhyme to be taught at nurseries everywhere.
