## More about 'Twinkle Twinkle Little Star'

One of the nursery rhymes that have been sung to children since time immemorial is twinkle twinkle little star. It is a poem that was first written by Jane Taylor at the beginning of the 19 th century and it carries magic of a miracle of a child when he/she gazes up at the night sky. Monotonous melody and the soft cadence enables young students to sing-in-time, and the lyrics enable to activate imagination and curiosity regarding universe, stars and space.

Alongside the relaxing music, the rhyme also provided children with rhymed patterns, vocabulary and rhythm of a poem. It can be often sung as a lullaby, which has a lovely and calming effect at bedtime. Parents and teachers also use it to start astronomy related conversations that will make kids think of questions like, what are stars made of? or "Why do stars shine? It is therefore not only amusing through this mere rhyme but also instills in small minds a feeling of love of learning and discovering.
